Results are based on telephone interviews conducted August 7-11, 2013 with a random sample of $\pm 2,059^2$ adults, aged 18+, living in all 50 U.S. states and the District of Columbia. For results based on these samples of national adults, one can say with 95% confidence that the margin of error is ± 3 percentage points.

For results based on the sample of $\pm 1,039^2$ adults who are employed full- or part-time, the maximum margin of sampling error is ± 4 percentage points.

For results based on the sample of $\pm 508^2$ parents with children in Kindergarten through Grade 12, the maximum margin of sampling error is ± 5 percentage points.

For results based on the sample of $\pm 1,052^{2}$ men, the maximum margin of sampling error is ± 4 percentage points.

For results based on the sample of $\pm 1,007^2$ women, the maximum margin of sampling error is ± 4 percentage points.

Interviews are conducted with respondents on landline telephones and cellular phones, with interviews conducted in Spanish for respondents who are primarily Spanish-speaking. Each sample of national adults includes a minimum quota of 50% cell phone respondents and 50% landline respondents, with additional minimum quotas by region.
